

Part 1 – Hazard Identification 1. General Description of the Work Area **Associated Hazards** Willen Lake South is one of The Parks Trusts busiest parks and consists of the Water lake itself and an area of parkland containing areas for events and a number of [Drowning, Leptospirosis, Blueactivity centres. Green Algae, Weirs & / or flood control structures] The lake itself is one of Milton Keynes main balancing lakes as part of the city flood defence plans, and its use for this purpose is controlled by Anglian Water. Slips, Trips & Falls [Fractures, Sprains, Abrasions] The Parks Trust has a wholly owned subsidiary company (Whitecap Leisure Limited) which runs the commercial activities that take place at Willen Lake Height South. [Falls] In general Parks will include many similar hazards. GENERAL	
Each area of park is assigned to an Area Landscape Manager and / or Landscape Officer who have the overall responsibility for that area.	
Additionally, each area has a designated Community Ranger who will regularly patrol their areas and be a point of contact for members of the public.	
WILLEN LAKE SOUTH	
Willen Lake South is operated as a commercial enterprise by The Parks Trust. All revenue generated is used by The Trust (a self-financing charity) to maintain over 6000 acres of parks and features within Milton Keynes.	
Parking is chargeable at this Willen Lake carparks.	
Many activities are undertaken at Willen Lake South. Further details are available via the website.

Third Party attractions and events may also operate at Willen Lake South, including Aqua Parcs https://aquaparcs.co.uk/ . These are all licenced and separately risk assessed and insured.	
WATER	
The Trust's policy recognises that the most positive way of counteracting drowning is to prevent unsupervised or controlled entry into the water in the first place. There are many possible causes of drowning which form the links in the drowning chain. It is essential to counter these factors and break the link in the chain as soon as possible, preferably before rescue is required.	
The links are:	
 Ignorance, disregard or misjudgement of danger. Unrestricted access to hazards. Absence of adequate supervision. An inability to save yourself or be rescued

With reference to the RoSPA drowning chain, the Trust will seek to break the chain in two places by;

- Providing information, guidance and education to help prevent ignorance, disregard or misjudgement of danger being a contributory cause.
- Manage its land and assets and collaborate with other parties to consider how individuals may either save themselves or be rescued.

Willen Lake may be liable to rapid rise in height of water due to nature of Milton Keynes flood defences. Associated control structures owned and operated by Anglian Water are located at Willen Lake North. There are likely to be strong currents at these locations.

Fishing pegs are provided at several locations and operated via licence agreement with Milton Keynes Angling Association.

Key Safety Messages

- Stay out of the water unless taking part in an organised and / or supervised activity. You cannot be sure what is in the water.
- If you end up in water unintentionally, float on your back to survive –
 cold water shock is a major hazard. Once your body has had a chance
 to adjust you will be better able to rescue yourself.
- Don't go into the water to rescue pets.
- Stay off ice in winter it probably will not support you.

TREES

The park contains a variety of trees of different species. Trees are living and dynamic organisms that are affected by changes to the conditions in which they are growing, the climate, pests and diseases.

Many factors can therefore lead to any individual tree becoming unstable and unpredictable, particularly as they age.

It is not possible to completely remove all risk to the public and property of trees falling on them without removing all trees above a certain size.

Therefore, The Trust's policy is to carefully and systematically assess all of our trees and manage and mitigate risk whilst maintaining its trees in good and healthy condition.

- Trees may be affected by numerous factors that affect their health & stability.
- Paths may be slippy & muddy. Wear suitable footwear.
- Never eat any part of a plant or fungi, or drink water from streams.
- Observe good hygiene wash hands, or clean them with wipes, before then eating anything.
- Be aware what stinging nettles & brambles look like & take care around them.
- Be aware of weather conditions and avoid sheltering under trees during storms.

INDIVIDUAL PARK FEATURES

All areas of operation at Willen Lake South have detailed operational procedures and suitably trained and qualified staff. Relevant standards are followed as required for individual activities

Water Sports

All water sports participants must wear a lifejacket.

• Treetop Extreme

Participants are briefed and wear safety harness equipment and climbing helmets during activities.

The courses are subject to regular internal and external checks and certifications.

Splash n Play

Numbers using the splash pad are controlled.

Water systems are subject to maintenance and cleaning regimes to ensure quality of water running through system.

Wakeboarding centre

The rig is inspected and maintained by a professional company to industry standards.

Participants wear lifejackets and helmets.

Public Art

The art works have individual characteristics and have all been assessed for their suitability to be located in the park.

• Play Park & Fitness Equipment

Equipment is internally inspected buy qualified play inspector and annually by RoSPA.

Archery

Takes place in separate area and led by qualified instructors.

Events

Numerous events are organised and run at the lake. Details of upcoming events can be found on the Willen Lake website https://www.willenlake.org.uk/whats-on-at-willen-lake. as well as publicised in various media.

Liaison with police, MK Council and other agencies occurs regularly.

Each event is subject to its own risk assessment and (if appropriate) detailed events plan. Third party events are licensed and required to provide detailed risk assessments, planned and have appropriate insurance cover in place (min £5mil indemnity).


Emergency Access
