

# Session Outline

## KS1 & 2: Environmental Heroes – Reduce, Reuse, Recycle.

This outline is a general guide for what to expect during your session with us. Activities and session structure may vary depending on weather conditions and other circumstances.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• What improves and harms their local, natural and built environments and about some of the ways people look after them.</li> <li>• To realise that people and other living things have needs, and that they have responsibilities to meet them.</li> <li>• Meet and talk with people (for example, with outside visitors such as religious leaders, police officers, the school nurse).</li> <li>• Why and how rules and laws are made and enforced, why different rules are needed in different situations and how to take part in making and changing rules.</li> <li>• Taking responsibility.</li> <li>• Identify and name a variety of everyday materials, including wood, plastic, glass, metal, water, and rock.</li> <li>• Recognise that environments can change and that this can sometimes pose dangers to living things.</li> </ul>	<p><b>Introduction</b> The class will have a brief welcome and introduction to the day.</p> <p><b>Activities</b> This interactive session is based around three main “Sustainability” principles: Reduce, Reuse and Recycle. Through a range of activities we will learn how to achieve all of these principles when visiting our local parkland, and how your students can improve their sustainability behaviours in their every day life. Activities may include, but are not limited to: Learning key words associated with sustainability, learning about litter, looking for key features of designing a city park and a trail looking at the importance of some of our smallest</p> <p><i>The activities of the day will depend on location and weather but will all cover the same topics and lesson aims.</i></p>	<p>To include: Discussion with children before, during and after the visit Photographs which you may take for post visit discussions, displays and activities.</p>

<p>Look up the what the words Reduce, Reuse and Recycle mean: <a href="https://www.reducereuserecycle.co.uk/">https://www.reducereuserecycle.co.uk/</a></p> <p>Go for a visit to your local park – what features of the park do you think help contribute positively to the environment? I.e. does it have lots of trees?</p>	<p>Redesign your local park – how would you develop this park in the next 10-20 years? Think about whether you would include more space for wildlife or people. Would there be more signage? More paths? Would the park have cattle?</p> <p>Take a litter picker, rubbish bag and gloves to your local park and help to keep it tidy for other people and animals.</p>	

Long grass and flowers for pollinators? Is there a water source?  
Think about all the different ways that a person might use their local park. Would any of these activities negatively impact the park? For example, if they bring a dog – is the dog's waste good for the plants/animals? Might that person leave litter behind?

Design a poster promoting the park you visited on your trip – why should people visit? What will they see? Is there any wildlife, play parks or car parking? Can wheelchairs get around?
