









JPR Quiz of the Year 2026

5	<p>True or false: it is <u>bad</u> to leave a dish of water out for thirsty wildlife during periods of harsh, hot weather.</p>
6	<p>Which three trees do acorns, hazelnuts and haws come from?</p> 
7	 <p>Why is it important not to move toadspawn or toadpoles? a) they return to the pond they spawned in b) it might damage them c) they get travelsick</p>
8	<p>What is a 'micro-habitat'? a) a huge collections of habitats b) it isn't real c) a smaller section of a habitat</p>
9	<p>Which of these is the only venomous snake in the UK? a) Grass snake b) Adder c) Corn snake</p> 
10	<p>How do grasshoppers and crickets "stridulate" (make chirping sounds)?</p>

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The answers!

1	c) Common tiger - these are found in India
2	b) August
3	Yes - ladybirds help spread pollen in a similar way to butterflies!
4	One point per right answer! Alder, Ash, Beech, Black Poplar, Blackthorn, Cherry, Crab Apple, Elder, Elm, Field Maple, Hawthorn, Hazel, Holly, Hornbeam, Lime, Oak, Rowan, Scots Pine, Silver Birch, Spindle, Willow, Yew. There are others to choose from too but these should get you started.
5	False - it is actually very kind and important to leave a small dish of freshwater out for thirsty mammals, birds and bugs during hot, dry times.
6	Acorns are from oaks; hazelnuts are from hazels; haws are from hawthorns.
7	a) they return to the pond they spawned in (but they also might be damaged or killed in the move, and this can spread diseases from pond to pond too. It is much better to leave creatures where you found them.)
8	c) a smaller section of a habitat
9	b) Adder
10	By rubbing two body parts together - like their legs and/or wings.
11	c) underwater
